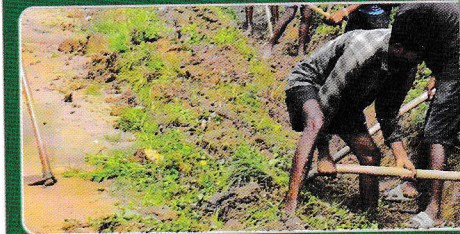

Executive Summary

Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan (LGSS) is committed to advancing sustainable and inclusive development across rural Jharkhand. Our mission focuses on enhancing agricultural productivity, promoting self-reliant livelihoods, protecting child rights, strengthening community institutions, and improving access to education and health services for marginalized populations. We envision rural communities where every individual—especially children, women, and vulnerable groups—has the opportunity to learn, grow, and prosper with dignity. Guided by the core values of integrity, participation, transparency, and environmental stewardship, LGSS continues to build strong community-led models of development.

During the reporting year 2024–25, LGSS successfully implemented a range of impactful programs across Lohardaga, Gumla, Garhwa, Chatra, Simdega, Latehar, and Palamu districts: Under the Access to Justice for Children (A2J) initiative, LGSS intervened in thousands of cases related to child marriage, trafficking, child labour, and child sexual abuse, ensuring rescue, legal support, rehabilitation, and social reintegration for survivors. Community awareness and institutional coordination led to strengthened child protection systems at the grassroots level.

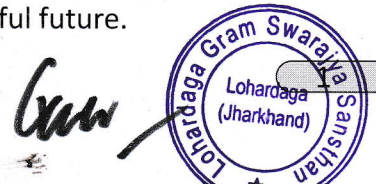
Through the India Literacy Project (ILP), LGSS improved the quality of early childhood education in 72 Anganwadi Centres, developed 40 model learning centres, supported adolescents through career guidance, and strengthened foundational learning through Village Learning Centres using the TaRL methodology.

In partnership with NABARD, LGSS implemented the Watershed (LREDP) Project in Dumri Block, treating land through soil and water conservation measures, developing farm ponds, and strengthening the Basanala Watershed Committee. Preparations for the Full Implementation Phase covering an additional 900 hectares are underway.

In collaboration with Goonj, the Cloth for Work programme mobilized community shramdaan for local infrastructure improvements, while providing essential clothing and household support to 1,150 families. With Operation Smile and Inga Health Foundation, free cleft lip and palate surgeries were organized, providing life-changing corrective treatment to 35 individuals, restoring dignity and confidence.

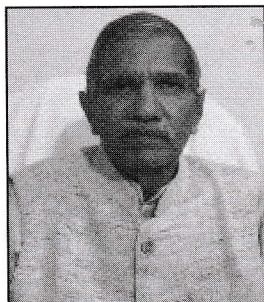
Through the Panchayat Sanctuary Initiative supported by Oxygen Plus, LGSS promoted environmental conservation by establishing a 5-acre community plantation of 2,000 saplings, nurturing long-term ecological sustainability and community ownership.

Across all initiatives, LGSS continued to work closely with local communities, government departments, and partner organizations, ensuring participatory development, local leadership, and lasting impact. The achievements of the year reaffirm our commitment to building resilient communities where every individual has rightful access to resources, opportunities, and a hopeful future.

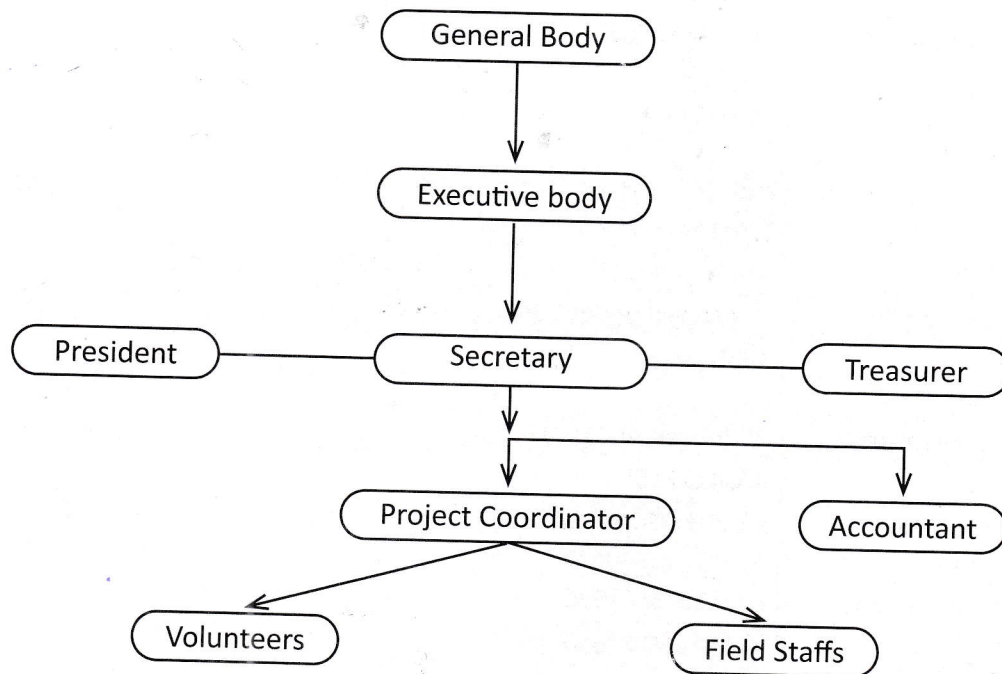
Genesis of organization:

In the year 1985, a few individuals from various sections of society, inspired by Gandhian philosophy and the noble idea of self-rule, founded Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan, registered as a trust in year 1992. The English interpretation of the name “Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan” is “Lohardaga Village Self-Rule Institution.” LGSS commits to this philosophy by transferring the ownership of all its efforts to the community, who are the ultimate beneficiaries. The founders were also influenced by the philosophies of Vinoba Bhave and Jayaprakash Narayan. They had deep concerns about the contemporary condition of Lohardaga, which had a long history of neglect from all sectors of society and had witnessed abject poverty despite having an abundance of resources. Later, this organization became registered under the Indian Trust Act, 1882, and the Foreign Contribution Regulation Act, 1976.

With a commitment to bring about socio-economic changes among the most downtrodden people in the area, especially among the women and children of the tribal population, and to establish a responsive environment for their needs, as well as to improve their quality of life, LGSS has walked a long journey of twenty-nine

years. However, the people at LGSS are still striving to achieve the ultimate goal of self-rule and are ready to continue their journey.

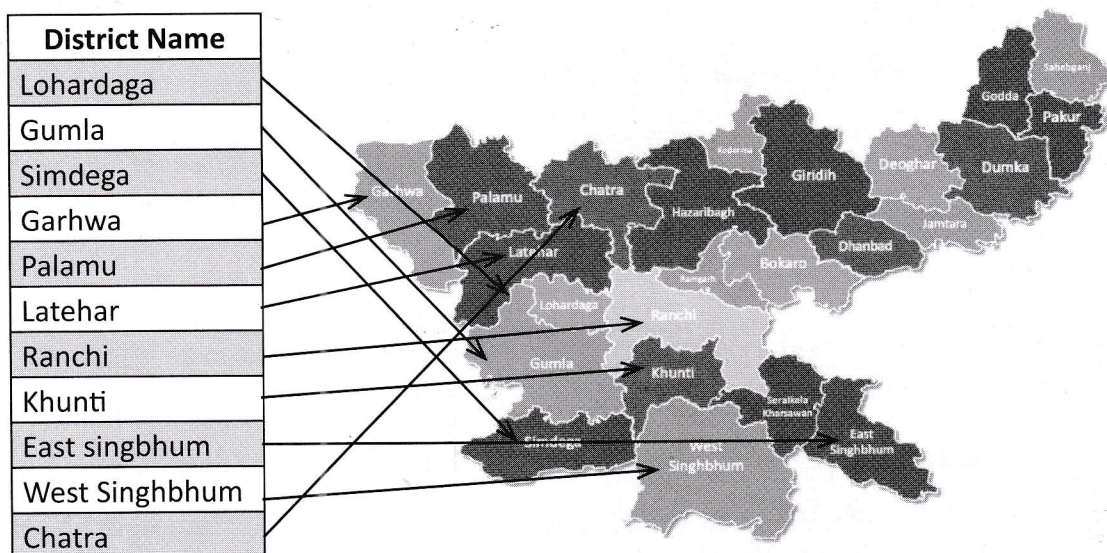
To empower the rural poor and disadvantaged communities in such a way that they can identify and utilize their potential and resources for their overall Development in a sustainable manner.

Child Rights and Child Protection: Access to Justice

“Access to Justice for Children (A2J)” is one of the largest civil societies–led legal intervention initiatives focused on ensuring that crimes against children do not go unpunished, and that survivors receive rehabilitation, counselling, and mental health support to restore a sense of normalcy. The program aims to build a strong child protection ecosystem that prevents

exploitation and ensures justice for survivors and their families.

A2J works to address and reduce child protection issues such as child marriage, child trafficking, child labour, and child sexual abuse (including online abuse) by promoting legal deterrence and public awareness. Through behaviour change and systemic reform, the program strives to create long-term and sustainable impact.

Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan has been implementing the Access to Justice program in four districts of Jharkhand namely Lohardaga, Gumla, Garhwa, and Chatra working in close collaboration with communities, institutions, and government agencies

Key Interventions and Achievements:

- Strengthened implementation of child protection laws to increase reporting, legal registration, and conviction rates in cases of trafficking and child sexual abuse.
- Worked closely with law enforcement to identify traffickers, prevent trafficking in real time, and rescue children from exploitative situations.
- Provided counselling and rehabilitation services to affected children, enabling access to statutory compensation and back wages for child labour survivors.
- Monitored and tracked online child trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation using digital tools to gather evidence and support prosecution of offenders.
- Conducted community outreach and capacity-building programs for police, teachers, and child protection officials to prevent child marriage, trafficking, and abuse at the grassroots level.
- Encouraged survivor leadership by supporting survivors to play active roles in awareness, prevention, and child protection advocacy.

Education: India Literacy Project

The India Literacy Project (ILP) funded by ILP-USA began its partnership with Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan (LGSS) in 2010. After successfully implementing the project in Kairo Block, the intervention was expanded to Kisko Block of Lohardaga District. Under the project, 40 villages and 72 Anganwadi Centres (AWs) are being supported. The program is now also extended to all Government High Schools in the district.

The project focuses on community empowerment, ensuring quality and holistic pre-school education, and strengthening adolescents' capacities to become responsible and informed citizens through career guidance and life skill support.

Major Activities Undertaken in 2024–2025

Training of Anganwadi Workers : LGSS provided training to 72 Anganwadi Centres on pre-school teaching methodologies using Teaching Learning Material (TLM). The training promotes socialization, cognitive development, communication, and problem-solving skills among children.

Model Anganwadi Centres : 40 AWCs were developed as Model Centres, where on-site mentoring and support were provided to Anganwadi Workers for developing and applying low-cost TLM from locally available resources.

School Readiness Assessment (SRA) : Using the SRA technique developed by CDF Karnataka, 101 children from the 40 Model Centres were assessed. Significant improvement was observed in children's readiness levels after post-assessment.

Provision and Use of TLM Materials : LGSS supplied raw materials and trained AWWs in developing and using low/no-cost TLMs such as empty bottles, weather chart, calendar chart, notice board, AWC rules, doctor set, kitchen set, building blocks, cups, children's ID cards, personal bags, and 4-colour bags (Red, Blue, Yellow, Green) to support organized learning.

Village Learning Centres (VLCs) : 16 Village Learning Centres were established with the support of 16 Vidya Saathis. A total of 293 students (131 Boys & 162 Girls) attended the VLCs, where Teaching at the Right Level (TaRL) methodology was used to strengthen foundational literacy and numeracy.

Learning Level Assessment (Pratham Tool) : Learning level assessments were conducted to identify slow learners. Focused support was provided to help children improve academic performance and confidence.

Career Guidance sessions in all government schools in Lohardaga district

Career Guidance is a structured process that supports students in making informed decisions about their education, skill development, and future career paths. It helps students understand various fields of study, identify their interests and strengths, and explore suitable opportunities for higher education and employment.

LGSS conducted **Career Guidance Sessions in all Government Schools of Lohardaga district. During these sessions, the Holland Code (RIASEC) Test was used as the career assessment tool. This test helps students understand their personality traits and align them with appropriate career options.

The Holland Code is based on six personality categories (RIASEC):

- R – Realistic: Prefers practical, hands-on work; enjoys working with tools, machines, or outdoor activities.
- I – Investigative: Curious and analytical; interested in research, science, and problem-solving.
- A – Artistic: Creative and expressive; enjoys activities like art, music, writing, and design.
- S – Social: Helpful and empathetic; prefers teaching, counselling, and working with people.
- E – Enterprising: Confident and persuasive; inclined towards leadership, management, business, or entrepreneurship.
- C – Conventional: Organized and detail-oriented; prefers structured tasks, clerical roles, and systematic work environments.

These sessions empowered students to understand themselves better and choose educational and vocational pathways that match their personality, abilities, and aspirations.

LGSS organized Career Guidance and Self-Discovery Sessions for students of Classes 9 to 12 across 62 Government High Schools and Inter Colleges in Lohardaga District. A total of 13,307 students participated in these sessions.

- ❖ 274 Career Guidance Sessions were conducted.
- ❖ The Self-Discovery Module was facilitated with 2,358 students to help them understand their interests, strengths, and future aspirations.
- ❖ One-on-one counseling support was provided to 156 students who required individualized guidance.
- ❖ These efforts helped students make informed decisions about their educational and career pathways.

Watershed Development

Watershed (LREDP) Project – Capacity Building Phase

Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan (LGSS), with the support of NABARD, is implementing the Watershed (LREDP) Project – Capacity Building Phase in Dumri Block of Gumla District during 2024–25. Under this initiative, 100 hectares of land have been treated to support soil and water conservation and enhance agricultural productivity. A farm pond was constructed in Latha Toli village under the Basanala Watershed to improve rainwater harvesting and irrigation availability.

The field activities focused on the following key components:

1. **Area Treatment:** Activities included farm bunding, trench-cum-bund (TCB) works, water absorption trenches (WAT), and earthen gully plugs (EGP). These measures help retain soil moisture, reduce runoff, and prevent soil erosion.
2. **Water Harvesting Structures:** Construction of a farm pond has enabled rainwater storage for irrigation during dry periods, directly benefiting small and marginal farmers.
3. **Drainage Line Treatment:** Loose boulder structures (LBS) were constructed to slow down surface runoff, reduce siltation, and improve groundwater recharge in downstream agricultural areas.

This phase is strengthening community-led watershed management practices and contributing to sustainable agricultural development in the region.

The third component is capacity building, with special focus on strengthening the Basanala Watershed Committee, the village-level institution responsible for planning, implementing, and monitoring watershed activities. Regular training and handholding support were provided to enhance the committee's technical and management skills.

Meanwhile, the Feasibility Study Report (FSR) for the Full Implementation Phase (FIP) is currently under preparation, covering an additional 900 hectares of watershed area. This groundwork will enable the project to transition from the Capacity Building Phase to the Full Implementation Phase, ensuring long-term water security, improved land productivity, and sustainable livelihood opportunities for the community.

Cloth for Work (CFW)

Since 2016, Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan (LGSS) has partnered with Goonj, New Delhi to implement the Cloth for Work (CFW) programme in Gumla and Lohardaga districts. Through this collaboration, more than 5,000 families have benefited to date. The initiative encourages communities to contribute shramdaan (voluntary labour) towards local development activities such as repairing drainage channels, constructing playgrounds and bathing spaces, cleaning small ponds, building community meeting sheds, and fencing Anganwadi Centres.

As recognition for their collective effort, each

LGSS supported 1,150 families under the "work-for-kit" model in year 2024-25. Key outcomes included:

- Repair of five small ponds
- Construction of one farm pond
- Restoration of 2,000 feet of drainage channels
- Plantation of 2,000 saplings

participating family receives a necessity kit containing clothes for men, women, and children, along with shoes, blankets, and other essential household items.

This initiative continues to strengthen community ownership, improve local infrastructure, and support vulnerable households with dignity. This ongoing partnership continues to strengthen community ownership, enhance local infrastructure and promote sustainable rural development across the two districts.

Operation Smile – Free Cleft Lip and Palate Surgery Camps

Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan (LGSS), in collaboration with Operation Smile and the Inga Health Foundation, organised free cleft lip and cleft palate surgical camps across the districts of Lohardaga, Gumla, Simdega, Latehar, Palamu, and Garhwa. The camps provided screening, counselling, referral, and surgical

support for children and adults born with congenital cleft conditions.

surgeries through this initiative. All beneficiaries have shown good post-operative recovery and are now experiencing improved health, speech. During 2024–25, a total of 35 individuals received successful corrective surgery, and self-confidence.

This programme reflects LGSS's commitment to ensuring access to specialised healthcare for vulnerable and marginalised communities, and to bringing lasting positive change in the lives of children and families affected by cleft lip and palate conditions.

Panchayat Sanctuary – Community Plantation and Green Initiative

With support from Oxygen Plus, Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan (LGSS) has developed a "Panchayat Sanctuary" in Maduadih village, Dumri Block, Gumla District. On five acres of panchayat land, 2,000 saplings of fruit-bearing and timber species such as mango, jamun, lemon, guava, semal, gulmohar, and jackfruit have been planted to promote ecological balance and environmental sustainability.

Local villagers are actively involved in the irrigation, weeding, and regular maintenance of the plantation, reinforcing ownership and community stewardship. The primary aim of the Panchayat Sanctuary is to increase green cover and enhance environmental awareness.

Over time, the plantation is expected to contribute to carbon absorption, improved soil health, and greater biodiversity, thereby strengthening

climate resilience in the region. Tharea is envisioned to gradually develop into a community park, creating opportunities for local eco-tourism and enriching the natural landscape of the village.

Auditor Opinion

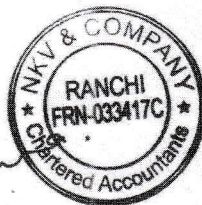
As part of our engagement and also as per the books of accounts produced before us for our verification, we report that

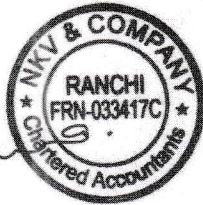
