- 5. Community Ownership** : We uphold the principle of community ownership, transferring the responsibility and benefits of our projects to the local population to ensure lasting change and self-rule.

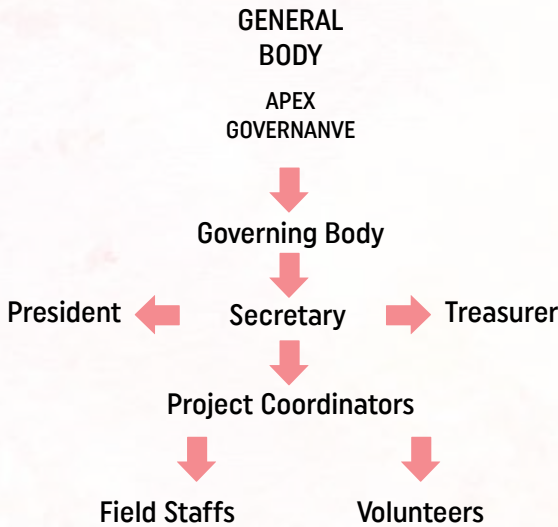
These values guide our mission to transform the lives of the rural poor and disadvantaged through dedicated and holistic development efforts.

HUMAN RESOURCES

In FY 2023-24, Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan employed a total of 141 individuals, including 77 full-time (39 male, 38 female) and 19 part-time (3 male, 16 female) staff. Additionally, 45 volunteers contributed, with 5 male and 40 female participants, reflecting a strong commitment to gender inclusivity presented in data table below:

PROGRAMS & INITIATIVES

In FY 2023-24, Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan (LGSS) operated eight projects across diverse districts, including including Lohardaga, Gumla, Chatra, Ranchi, Garhwa, East singbhum and Hazaribagh. These initiatives addressed critical issues such as child rights, child protection, education, career development, and livelihood enhancement. The projects catered to a broad range of beneficiaries, including children of all ages, from infancy to 12th grade, girls, women SHG members, and farmers.

LGSS's comprehensive approach has previously included programs in Health & Hygiene, Nutrition, Farmer Producer Organizations, Watershed Development, Water & Sanitation, Capacity Building, Orchard Development, Agricultural Development, and Pre-School and Primary Education. By focusing on both farm and non-farm livelihoods, LGSS aims to improve

the overall well-being of rural communities. The organization's diverse programmatic portfolio demonstrates its commitment to addressing various socio-economic challenges and enhancing the quality of life for its beneficiaries through integrated and sustainable development efforts.

1. ACCESS TO JUSTICE

The Access to Justice Project, implemented by Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan (LGSS) in collaboration with the Kailash Satyarthi Children's Foundation, aims to combat child marriage, child trafficking, child labour, and sexual abuse across 21 blocks in Lohardaga, Gumla, and Garhwa districts, impacting over 450 villages. The project engages communities at multiple levels, from village to district, working with local leaders, government officials, and civil society to promote child protection.

Key activities in 2023 include the Akshaya Tiritiya Campaign, which stopped 65 child marriages and gathered 301,145 promises from villagers. The project rescued 48 children from child labor, facilitated FIRs, and declared child labour-free zones. Events like the Child Labour Day Rally, World Day Against Trafficking, and International Day of the Girl Child raised awareness about children's rights.

The Child Marriage Free India Campaign and Gram Sabha Gatherings united 1,235 villages in pledging to end child marriage. These efforts, along with rallies, candle marches, and the January 26 Tableau, reflect LGSS's commitment to creating a safe and just environment for children.



Success Story No. 1 Procecutation against Sexual Exploitation

The minor victim, Aashamuni Kumari (Name Changed), is 17 years old of Udmudu Village was sexually abused by a person who was living with the victim's grandmother two year back. After the assault, the accused persuaded the victim to stay silent and promised for marry. Over the next two years, he continued to maintain a physical relationship with her under the guise of marriage. During this period, the victim became pregnant four times, and each time she was given medication to terminate the pregnancy. In April 2023, the victim discovered that the accused was planning to marry another girl. With institutional support, the victim approached the Women's Police Station in Lohardaga and filed an FIR against the accused under POCSO Act.

LGSS provided comprehensive support to the victim and her family throughout the legal process. This included counselling, filing the FIR, facilitating her court appearance, and ensuring her safety during the trial. The support team also helped with necessary documentation, guided the victim through the court procedures, assisted in opening a bank account, and retrieving her educational certificates. Regular counselling and encouragement were offered to the victim and her family, helping them cope during the trial and enabling her rehabilitation.

After a year-long trial, the court sentenced the accused to 21 years of rigorous imprisonment and a ₹25,000 fine. The District Legal Services Authority facilitated the victim's compensation approval. The support person encouraged the victim to pursue higher education. She is now safe and living with her parents.





Success Story No. 2 Procecutation against Child Abuse

The minor victim, Jonika Oraon (Name Changed), aged 14, moved to Ningani Kumbatoli, Lohardaga district in 2022 with her elder sister, renting a house to continue her studies. A man from same village, along with a boy from Chandkopa village, after giving threatening raped her. The victim informed her parents about the incidence, but the family asked her to remain silent due to infamy.

LGSS convinced the family and other support included counselling, filing an FIR, and facilitating the victim's testimony in court despite threats from the accused. After a two-and-a-half-year trial, the court sentenced the perpetrators to 20 years of imprisonment and a ₹36,000 fine. LGSS, with the District Legal Services Authority, secured compensation for the victim and helped her enrol in Class 8 at Kasturba Gandhi Girls' Residential School.

Success Story No. 3 Prevention from Child Marriage

On March 11, 2023, the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) intervened to stop Manita Kumari's planned marriage by obtaining a written assurance from her parents that the marriage would be postponed as she is minor. Despite this, the marriage was rescheduled and conducted on May 27, 2023. Upon learning of the marriage, LGSS notified the CWC, which then instructed the Child Marriage Prohibition Officer (CMPO) to file an FIR. An FIR was subsequently registered on September 1, 2023, at Meral Police Station.



Success Story No. 4 Rescue & Rehabilitation

On August 11, 2023, 15-year-old Suman Oraon from Nigni village, Jharkhand, was trafficked to Rajasthan for domestic labour. Her family discovered her plight and, on August 20, Suman contacted her father, who sought help from activist Balmani Kumari. A formal complaint was filed on August 13, 2023, with FIR No. 2/2023. Coordinated efforts between local police, Rajasthan authorities, and LGSS led to Suman's rescue on August 26, 2023. Upon return, she received essential counselling from LGSS, aiding her emotional recovery. Legal actions were taken against the traffickers, reinforcing the fight against child trafficking. The community's support was crucial for Suman's reintegration, and she was encouraged to continue her education. The collaborative efforts ensured Suman's safe return and provided the necessary support for her recovery and reintegration into society.





2. Addressing Trafficking through effective prevention & reintegration in west Bengal & Jharkhand – TDH PROJECT

The “Advocacy and Evidence Building through Participatory Action Research for Prevention of Trafficking in Persons and Reintegration of Victims of Trafficking and Exploitation” project, in collaboration with Terre des Hommes (Tdh), aims to combat trafficking and exploitation in Jharkhand. Since 2016, LGSS and Tdh have worked together to support the reintegration of trafficking survivors and strengthen community resilience against exploitation. The project employs a Kabaddi-based methodology, engaging five Panchayats in Kisko Block, Lohardaga District, focusing on gender, mental health, safeguarding, and community support.

In 2023-2024, the project reached 865 adolescents through sessions on mental health, gender, and sexuality, leading to significant behavioural changes and increased safety awareness. Community awareness sessions for 750 members enhanced understanding and support for gender equality and child protection. Engagement with 286 male members improved their role in promoting gender equality and preventing trafficking. Additionally, 255 community influencers were empowered to advocate for gender equality and child protection.

The project also extended its reach to additional locations in Jharkhand, including districts Chatra, East Singhbhum, and Ranchi. Activities in these areas involved training programs on mental health, gender, child rights, and safety, creating safer environments for children. These collective efforts have fostered safer, more supportive communities and empowered at-risk girls against unsafe migration.



Success Story No. 5 Empowering Adolescent Girls through Kabbadi & Skill Development

In 2023-24, the Logardaga Gram Swaraj Sansthan, in partnership with Terre des Hommes (TDH), established the Pooja Kishori Group in Gosai Toli, Kisko village. This group of 15 adolescent girls participates in weekly sessions focused on self-defence, Kabaddi, career guidance, and awareness programs, including the eradication of drug abuse and gambling. The group has excelled in Kabaddi, securing second place in competitions from the Panchayat to the inter-district level and receiving sports jerseys from the Kisko police station. Additionally, the girls engage in economic activities, such as making and selling brooms and foot mats at the local market, which contributes to their financial empowerment and community involvement. This holistic approach not only builds physical and emotional resilience but also fosters economic independence among the participants.





3. Empowerment of community for ensuring quality & relevant primary education of Adolescents as responsible citizen in kisko block of lohardaga

The "Empowerment of Community for Ensuring Quality and Relevant Primary Education of Adolescents as Responsible Citizens" project, funded by the India Literacy Project (ILP-USA), has been implemented by LGSS since 2010. Initially launched in Kairo block, the project was expanded to Kisko block, covering 40 villages, 34 schools, and 72 Anganwadi Centres (AWCs) in Lohardaga district.

The project focuses on ensuring quality preschool education for children aged 3-5 in AWCs and improving primary education for children aged 6-14 with an emphasis on 100% admission, attendance, and retention in schools and Village Learning Centers (VLCs). Key achievements include training 72 AWCs in preschool teaching methods using locally sourced Teaching-Learning Materials (TLM), establishing 20 VLCs supported by 20 Vidya Saathi, and providing educational support to 437 community children. The project also conducts learning level assessments to identify and improve slow learners, and school readiness assessments for preschool children, helping them transition smoothly into formal education. These initiatives aim to build a strong educational foundation for the children in the community.

Success Story No. 6 Transforming Pre School Education at Parehpat Anganwadi

At Anganwadi Center (AWC) Parehpat in Kisko Block, Lohardaga, the India Literacy Project (ILP) in partnership with LGSS has made a profound impact on early childhood education. After receiving specialized training and Teaching-Learning Materials (TLM), including locally sourced items like building blocks and weather charts, the Anganwadi workers transformed the learning environment. Children aged 3-5 years actively engaged in cognitive and social development activities, showing noticeable improvements in communication and problem-solving skills. This successful model at Parehpat AWC exemplifies how the project empowered local educators and significantly enhanced preschool education in the community.





4. Career Guidance Sessions in all Government Schools of Lohardaga District



Funded by the India Literacy Project (ILP-USA), this project aims to provide students in Lohardaga's government schools and inter-colleges with career guidance and self-discovery opportunities. Launched in 2023-2024, the initiative targets students in Classes 9 to 12, offering them the tools and knowledge needed to plan their careers effectively.

Key activities include the development of a comprehensive career guidance material and the training of volunteers to conduct sessions in schools. Over 10,565 students across Lohardaga District participated in career guidance and self-discovery sessions, where they were introduced to various career paths and conducted interest assessments using ILP's validated system.



A special session for 68 high school teachers was organized at DIET Chiri on February 2, 2024, in collaboration with the Lohardaga Education Department. The objective was to equip educators with the skills needed to mentor students in making informed career choices.

This project not only empowers students to make better decisions about their future but also strengthens the support system within schools, ensuring a lasting impact on their career readiness.

Success Story No. 7 Satmuni Oroan's Journey to ITI by Overcoming Financial Barriers

Satmuni Oroan, a resident of Gurgaon Shahbuti village in Lohardaga District, passed her matriculation from UP Girls High School, Shahbuti, in 2024. Despite her academic success, Satmuni's dreams of further education were clouded by her family's financial struggles, making her uncertain about continuing her studies.

During a career guidance session conducted by the India Literacy Project (ILP), Satmuni was introduced to vocational courses as a potential path forward. She expressed interest in enrolling in ITI (Industrial Training Institute) but was concerned about the costs.

The ILP team informed her about ITI College in Kujra, Lohardaga, where fees were minimal. After discussing with her family, Satmuni enrolled in the ITI course, allowing her to pursue her aspirations without imposing a financial burden on her household.

Through this opportunity, Satmuni is now on track to build a stable future, demonstrating how targeted guidance can empower students facing financial challenges.





Success Story No. 8 : Amit Thakur Path to ITI by Overcoming Financial Barriers

Amit Thakur, a bright student from Sheela Agrawal Saraswati Vidya Mandir, Lohardaga, passed his matriculation in 2024 but faced confusion in selecting subjects for further studies. Initially, he planned to join his friends in choosing similar subjects at an inter-college. However, during a career guidance session organized by the India Literacy Project (ILP), Amit participated in a personality test that revealed his strong inclination toward engineering and his desire to pursue IIT.

Despite his aspirations, Amit hesitated to discuss this with his family due to their financial constraints. The ILP team intervened, engaging with Amit's parents to explain the importance of supporting his dreams. With their encouragement, Amit applied for a scholarship at a coaching institute in Kota, Rajasthan, and successfully secured one, minimizing the financial burden.

Now, with focused preparation in Kota, Amit is diligently working toward his IIT goals, showcasing the impact of timely guidance and support.

5. livelihood enhancement of poor & marginalized farmers of kairo block, Lohardaga district of Jharkhand through climate change adoptive farming & Employment generation with mnerga convergence program

The Livelihood Promotion program, supported by Azim Premji Philanthropic Initiatives, was launched in May 2021 in Kairo block, Lohardaga district, to uplift the poor and marginalized communities. The project spanned 26 villages across five panchayats, impacting 7,190 households and a total population of 37,867, with 62.28% belonging to Scheduled Tribes such as Munda and Oraons. With 80% of the population falling into the small and marginal category, the project directly benefited around 4,500 households, focusing on employment generation, capacity development, women's empowerment, food security, and income enhancement.



Key activities included village meetings, training sessions, workshops, exposure visits, and field demonstrations on organic farming techniques. Major achievements include the establishment of 139 compost pits and 2,712 farmers producing organic manure for personal and commercial use. The project also supported livestock-based income improvements, with 630 households seeing a 20% increase in income through paravet services. Additionally, 1,055 households experienced a 30% income rise through various project schemes. By promoting sustainable farming and livelihood practices, the program successfully improved household incomes and food security in the region, contributing to long-term economic resilience.

This project highlights the effectiveness of community-driven interventions in addressing poverty and promoting sustainable livelihoods.

Success Story No. 9 Empowering Change through Organic Farming : The Story of Anita Oraon

Anita Oraon, a farmer from Nagda village, Kairo block, Lohardaga, faced challenges with declining crop yields due to chemical fertilizers and pesticides. With only 2.5 acres of land and five family members relying on agriculture and livestock, her income was limited, creating financial strain.

In 2021, a livelihood promotion project by Lohardaga Gram Swaraj Sansthan (LGSS) introduced organic farming to the region. Anita joined a farmer's group and attended training sessions on organic fertilizers, learning to make Jeevamrit, Beejamrit, and other organic inputs. With support from the project staff, she applied these techniques to her chili and onion crops, noticing significant improvements in yield.

Inspired by her success, Anita began producing organic fertilizers for sale, earning Rs. 30 per liter for Jeevamrit and Rs. 10 per liter for cow urine. To date, she has sold 620 liters of organic fertilizers, creating a new source of income for her family. Anita now sees organic farming as a sustainable business, empowering her to uplift her family and community.



Success Story No. 10 Transforming Yield with SRI : Rajmuni Devi Story

Rajmuni Devi, a small farmer from Kairo village in Lohardaga, lives with her husband, two sons, and two daughters. With only 1.3 acres of land, her family relied on farming and unskilled labor for livelihood. In July 2021, Rajmuni attended a training session by Lohardaga Gram Swaraj Sansthan on the System of Rice Intensification (SRI) method of paddy cultivation.

Inspired by the training, she decided to implement SRI on 20 decimals of her land. Under the guidance of the project staff, she used Jeevamrit (organic fertilizer) and carefully followed SRI practices, including planting paddy seedlings 12 inches apart. The results were impressive. Her paddy crops developed 42-48 tillers per plant, compared to only 12-15 in traditional methods.

Rajmuni harvested 18 quintals of paddy from her plot, compared to the 6-7 quintals she used to get through conventional farming. She was thrilled with the higher yield and lower input costs, and plans to adopt SRI for all her fields in the coming years. Rajmuni thanks the institution for its support in transforming her farming practices





Success Story No. 10 : Increased Wheat Yield with SRI : Etwariya Journey To Success

Etwareya Oraon, a small farmer from Utka village in Kairo block, is one of 173 farmers selected under the Livelihood Enhancement Project by Lohardaga Gram Swaraj Sansthan. As part of the project, she received training on the System of Wheat Intensification (SRI) and organic farming practices like making Jeevamrit and matka fertilizer.

Motivated by the training, Etwariya applied the SRI method on her 15 decimal plot. She used organic manure, treated seeds, and followed the guidance of the project staff. After just 15 days, she applied Jeevamrit and matka fertilizer, which significantly boosted crop growth. Her wheat plants developed 35-40 tillers from each seed, compared to the much lower yield from traditional methods.

As a result, Etwariya harvested 7 sacks of wheat, much higher than the 4-5 sacks she used to get. The increased yield allowed her to sell surplus produce in the market, boosting her income. Grateful for the project's support, Etwariya plans to use SRI for all her fields in the future.

6. Goong (Cloth for work}

Since 2016, LGSS has collaborated with Goonj on the "Cloth for Work" (CFW) program, aimed at developing village infrastructure while providing essential goods to workers as remuneration, ensuring dignity in their labour. The program has become a key initiative to build and maintain community assets while supporting vulnerable families with necessities.

In 2023-2024, the program benefited 1,760 families who received essential kits containing clothes, shoes, blankets, and other essentials.

Alongside this, significant infrastructure development was achieved, including the creation of 12 farm ponds to boost agricultural productivity and the renovation of 2 large ponds serving as crucial water reservoirs. Additionally, 8 drains were cleaned, improving local sanitation, and 10 km of kachha roads were repaired, enhancing connectivity in rural areas.

The program also extended support to

education, with 400 school kits distributed to students from four schools, providing necessary materials for their studies. Furthermore, two marriage kits were provided to financially struggling families to support their daughters' weddings.

This holistic approach through the CFW program not only improves village infrastructure but also strengthens the community by addressing basic needs and restoring dignity to labourers through essential goods and support.





Success Story No. 11 : Road Widening brings New Opportunities in Gajani Village

In Gajani Village, Kairo Block, Lohardaga, 43 families joined hands to widen a 1-kilometer stretch of road under the Goonj project. Over the course of two weeks, the villagers worked diligently to transform the narrow pathway, which previously allowed only two-wheelers to pass, into a broader road suitable for four-wheelers. This development has significantly improved transportation for the community, particularly for farmers who once struggled to transport their produce to the market. With the improved road, farmers can now use three-wheelers and four-wheelers, increasing efficiency and reducing transportation challenges. This collective effort has not only enhanced connectivity but also strengthened the village's economic opportunities, bringing prosperity to Gajani.

7. Enhancing Green Coverage & Mitigating Climate Change

In 2023, LGSS, in collaboration with Goonj, New Delhi, launched an ambitious "Green Initiative" in Kairo Block of Lohardaga district. The project aimed to transform the local landscape by distributing 10000 saplings of Mango, Lemon, Guava, Amla, and Mahogany to farmers in 17 villages. These trees were not only meant to increase greenery but also support sustainable agriculture and help mitigate the effects of climate change.

Farmers eagerly took part in the initiative, planting saplings around their fields and homes. Over time, the trees began to take root, enhancing biodiversity and providing long-term benefits like fruit, timber, and shade. This project also played a vital role in fostering awareness about the importance of green cover and environmental sustainability among the villagers.

By engaging the community, the project has not only contributed to a greener landscape but also provided farmers with additional income opportunities, making the initiative a win-win for both the environment and local livelihoods. The saplings will grow into a legacy of climate resilience for future generations.





8. Livelihood Enterprise & Development Program (Ledp} - Production of Rope by Solar Power Machine in Jari Block, Gumla District

The "Rope Making Through Solar Power" project, funded by NABARD, Jharkhand Regional Office, has empowered 90 families in two villages—Satar and Humgaon in Albert Ekka Jari Block. Traditionally, women in these villages were making ropes from grass and other locally sourced materials, selling them in local markets to supplement their household income. However, their traditional methods limited both production and earnings.

To address this, the project provided the women Self Help Group (SHG) members in these villages with specialized training in making plastic ropes from discarded plastic sacks.

These women learned the technical skills required to convert waste materials into durable plastic ropes, an initiative that both enhances livelihoods and promotes recycling.

In addition to the training, each village received a solar-powered rope-making machine. This sustainable energy solution not only ensures a continuous production process but also reduces operational costs. The solar-powered machinery has significantly boosted production, allowing the women to manufacture larger quantities of plastic ropes with less effort and time.

As a result, the SHG members now produce and sell plastic ropes in local markets, where demand has been steady. The project has increased their productivity, thereby improving their income levels. This initiative has not only enhanced the economic stability of these families but also contributed to waste management and environmental sustainability by repurposing plastic waste into useful products.





FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

Income Statement

Lohardaga Gram Swarajya Sansthan (LGSS) recorded a total income of Rs 2,26,13,838.03 in FY 2023-24, primarily from grants, including Rs 1,56,88,271 from FCRA sources and Rs 7,69,978 from domestic grants. Additionally, other receipts, such as bank interest and FD maturity, contributed Rs 24,03,012. Program expenses totalled Rs 1,94,03,511.60, with the majority spent on FCRA-funded projects (Rs 1,54,08,438.98), indicating strong program activity. Administrative expenses were Rs 14,30,951.08.

Balance Sheet

The balance sheet reflects a stable financial position with total liabilities and assets amounting to Rs 78,61,448.58. The capital fund stands at Rs 63,47,460.58, showing sound capital retention. Current liabilities and provisions total Rs 15,13,988, which reflects adequate provisions for operating obligations. The fixed asset base is Rs 26,60,980.15, representing long-term investments in infrastructure.

Cash Flow Statement

While LGSS managed Rs 2,29,89,79 through matured fixed deposits, total payments matched receipts, with Rs 50,000 spent on loans and advances and Rs 5,33,949 allocated towards asset acquisition. This efficient cash management allowed LGSS to close the year with a balance of Rs 26,26,377.46.

Significant Financial Trends

LGSS exhibited strong reliance on FCRA funding, which accounted for approximately 95% of its income. However, a healthy opening and closing balance indicates good liquidity management. The increase in asset acquisition reflects a positive trend towards long-term development.

Auditor's Report

The audit for FY 23-24 is done with necessary statutory compliance and the audited figures suggest that LGSS maintained transparency and accountability in managing funds and assets, adhering to statutory compliance. The Audited Balance Sheet and Receipt is annexed.

Another impactful initiative is the road widening project in Gajani Village, where 43 families collaborated to improve a kilometer-long road. This development has enabled four-wheelers to access the village, making it easier for farmers to transport their produce to markets, thereby increasing their income and reducing logistical challenges.

Quantitatively, LGSS's reach is substantial. The organization has actively engaged with over 1,000 families across 30 villages in Lohardaga district. Through its various programs, LGSS has facilitated the distribution of 5,000 plants, supported the formation of numerous self-help groups, and provided training to hundreds of farmers. These efforts have collectively improved livelihoods, enhanced agricultural productivity, and fostered community resilience. LGSS's initiatives continue to drive positive change, making a lasting difference in the lives of the rural population.

The establishment of self-help groups and farmer cooperatives further enhances the sustainability of its programs by fostering collective action and resource sharing.

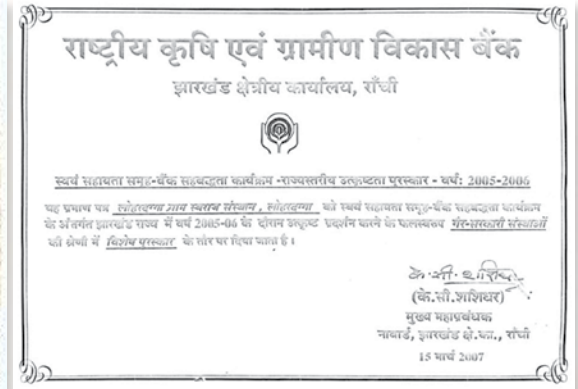
